# Optimist Theatre Announces Free Shakespeare in the Park's "Unsphere the Stars" Fundraiser

MILWAUKEE, WIS. – Milwaukee's Optimist Theatre, presenter of Free Shakespeare in the Park, has announced its "Unsphere the Stars" fundraiser in support of this summer's performance of the comedy "The Winter's Tale." As has become the organization's custom since the establishment of Free Shakespeare in the Park in 2010, the fundraiser will take the form of a variety show with silent auction. The event has been set for Wednesday, February 12, 2014 at Milwaukee's Turner Hall Ballroom (1034 N. 4<sup>th</sup> Street). Doors open at 7 p.m., and the show begins at 8 p.m. Tickets are available at Optimist Theatre's website, www.optimisttheatre.org/support.

Mr. Philip Earl Johnson, master of physical and musical comedy, will headline the entertainment of "Unsphere the Stars." Johnson's credits include live performances of juggling, ropewalking and comedy as MooNiE the Magnif'Cent – described by one columnist as "nearly Cirque du Soleil good," as well as a variety of stage and television appearances, primarily in the greater Chicago area. He has performed in many roles for the Illinois Shakespeare Festival, including Macbeth, Cyrano de Bergerac, Coriolanus and Marc Antony.

Proceeds from "Unsphere the Stars" will fund the free presentation of William Shakespeare's "The Winter's Tale" at the COA Youth and Family Centers' amphitheater in Alice Bertschy Kadish Park in June 2014. The new season will mark the fifth year of production of Free Shakespeare in the Park and will see its run grow from its previous two weeks to encompass three weekends, and a total of 12 performances. All receipts from the fundraiser will be matched by BMO Harris Bank, Shakespeare in the Park's Presenting Sponsor, as part of a \$20,000 challenge grant.

Tickets may be purchased individually for \$35 each (\$20 of which is tax deductible) or by table (of six) for \$300. 100% tax-deductible donations may also be made at the Optimist Theatre website. "Unsphere the Stars" will also include a silent auction offering a variety of donated items and services, including several one-of-a-kind works by local artists.

### About "The Winter's Tale"

Generally believed to have been written later in Shakespeare's career (1610-1611), "The Winter's Tale" is a romantic comedy of jealousy and suspected infidelity, revenge, and ultimately, of redemption and reunion. It contains one of the most famous stage directions in English literary history: "Exit, pursued by a bear." Some speculate that, because the Elizabethan theaters were housed in the same sketchy entertainment district as the "bear baiting" pits, it is possible that one or more performances featured a live bear.

Of further interest to historians, the plot, in which a monarch falsely accuses his consort of adultery, appears to parallel the fall of Queen Anne Boleyn, second wife to King Henry VIII, and may have been an allusion to which the Bard's audience would have been attuned.

The "Unsphere the Stars" title of the 2014 fundraiser is taken from a speech by Hermione from the play's first act:

Verily!

You put me off with limber vows; but I, Though you would seek to unsphere the stars with oaths, Should yet say 'Sir, no going.' Verily, You shall not go: a lady's 'Verily' 's As potent as a lord's. Will you go yet?
Force me to keep you as a prisoner,
Not like a guest; so you shall pay your fees
When you depart, and save your thanks. How say you?
My prisoner? or my guest? by your dread 'Verily,'
One of them you shall be.
